
Club photo archivist needed





Update from our Treasurer

Financially Speaking...

AHGC had another successful year financially! Please see the Treasurer's Annual Report in the Members Only section of the website. It's great to know that we were able to raise funds through our plant sale and garden walk to be able to support scholarships and so many like minded 501c3 organizations. Speaking of 501c3 organizations, the Arlington Heights Garden Club became a registered charity under IRS code section 501c3 in 2023. That means that we can accept charitable contributions from individuals and other legal entities i.e. donor advised funds, corporations etc.

If you are interested in making a donation to the garden club, please consult your tax advisor. There are many ways of doing so that can help your overall tax position. Things to consider include: donating appreciated stock to avoid capital gains, donating from an IRA to reduce required minimum distributions in the future, donating Qualified Charitable Distributions to satisfy required minimum distributions without having to pay tax on the distribution. This discussion is not a one size fits all scenario. Please discuss with your tax advisor or financial planner before making any decisions.





Spotlight on the Program Committee






Program Committee



If It Hurts, Stop Doing It


String Beans Taught Me Not to Fear Death
